

1 John 1:1-10 Inductive Discovery Lesson 16

Proclaiming Love What is the first thing you do when you walk into a dark room? You look for the light. Light keeps us from stumbling and bumping into obstacles in darkness. Light helps us to see where we're going. Light *shines*. It can't be dark!

In the beginning God said, "Let there be light," and He separated the light from the darkness. God didn't create humanity to live in the shadows—it was sin that let darkness in. It was sin that separated man from God. But when Jesus stepped into our sin-blackened world, God was saying again, "Let there be light." Jesus is the Light! He is Love! This is the message that John proclaimed.

Author As a young man, John didn't seem destined to be known as the "apostle of love." In fact, Jesus' nickname for John and his brother James was the Sons of Thunder! John had a strong and ambitious spirit by nature. He brashly rebuked a man for casting out demons in Jesus' name because the man didn't belong to their group (Mark 9:38). He asked for a place of privilege in Jesus' kingdom (Mark 10:35) without grasping the depth of suffering that lay ahead. And when a Samaritan village refused to show them hospitality, John's first reaction (Luke 9:54) was to ask Jesus if they should call down fire to consume the entire population!

How is it possible that such a competitive, hot-headed individual would later write with heartfelt conviction, "Beloved, let us love one another" (1 John 4:7)? We can answer that question in one word: *transformation*. Compassionate love didn't come naturally to John, but he experienced it and learned what true love is from his Lord's example. Surrendering his strong tendencies to the Holy Spirit's control, he became a passionate man mellowed by grace and knowledge. The harsh demeanor was gone—but zeal for the truth remained.

Background Christianity was well-established in the Roman world by the end of the first century A.D. All the documents that compile the New Testament had been written. John's eyewitness gospel account and his letters were among the last writings, penned sometime around 90 A.D.

John was an old man near the end of a long life when he wrote this letter. He had been an eyewitness to Jesus' earthly life, ministry, death and resurrection. He had devoted many years to spreading the gospel and helping to establish the early church. As the last of the twelve, John carried a living memory of that unique band of brothers...and of mourning their loss, one by one. In fact, he had lived long enough to see most of the generation of eye-witness believers pass away.

Now John was observing a troubling rise of new ideas and false teachings take hold in the church. Some were distorting the truth about who Jesus was and His purpose for dying on the cross. Duty-bound to set the record straight, John "the elder" (as he called himself) sent off this letter to the churches.

Approximate Timeline of Key Events during John's life:

c. A.D. 27	Jesus calls John to be one of His disciples.
c. A.D. 30	Jesus' Crucifixion and Resurrection. From the cross, Jesus entrusts the care of His mother to John. Pentecost: Peter preaches and 3,000 are saved. Birth of the Early Church in Jerusalem.
c. A.D. 30-47	Church growth—spread of the Gospel. News of salvation among Samaritans reaches Jerusalem; Peter and John are sent to witness the work there; they pray for the Samaritan believers who then receive baptism of the Holy Spirit.
c. A.D. 44	John's brother, James, is executed by Herod.
c. A.D. 47	Paul begins his first missionary journey.
c. A.D. 67	Paul and Peter are executed in Rome. John is living and ministering in Ephesus.
c. A.D. 70	Rome destroys the temple in Jerusalem. Church is scattered.
c. A.D. 85-90	John writes his Gospel account and letters.
c. A.D. 93	John is exiled to the island of Patmos.
c. A.D. 96	John is allowed to return to Ephesus upon the death of Emperor Domition. John writes Revelation.
c. A.D. 98	Death of John.

OBSERVE

Start by reading the entire chapter at least once. Now read each section and record what you see. **Use the first column to keep track of what you find in the Bible passage**. (Who? What? When? Where?) Briefly describe, *in your own words*, what it says.

Use the second column to keep track of information you get from other sources such as scripture references, a dictionary, concordance, maps, etc. You can also use this section to jot down **your thoughts, impressions or questions.** *Do your best to follow John's train of thought.* Does he use a word or phrase repeatedly, or emphasize a particular topic? Are his words urgent? Encouraging? Commanding? What issues or problems does he address? What questions does he ask?

INTERPRET

Look for a spiritual lesson. Be careful not to read into the Bible an idea that is not there. Examine each verse in light of the verses around it. To help you find a spiritual lesson, ask questions such as: Is there a command to obey? Is there a promise to claim? Is there a condition to that promise? Is there a warning to heed? Is there an example to follow or avoid? **State the lesson in one simple sentence.**

APPLY

We don't study the Bible just to gather information—we want to spiritually grow. Our heart needs to be open to change. The only way to move truth off the pages of your Bible and into your life is to *put it into action*.

To apply a spiritual lesson, we must examine ourselves and take deliberate steps to do something with what we have learned. Ask yourself: Is this a new insight for me, or does it reinforce what I already know? What does it challenge me to do? Does it point out error in my attitude or actions? What changes does it require? Think of how the lesson relates to you and what specific course of action you will take. Write your application in the form of a question to make it personal.
